Junior Tournament Preview

In 1947, the first boys' singles event was held at Roland Garros, with the girls' singles event taking place 6 years later in 1953. The boys' doubles and girls' doubles events were introduced in 1981. This is the 79th edition of the boys' singles tournament here, the 70th edition of the girls' singles tournament, and the 33rd editions of both the boys' doubles and girls' doubles tournaments.

2022 Roland Garros is the 121st edition of the French championships overall, which began in 1891 as a closed championship reserved for national players or players enrolled in French clubs, and the 92nd tournament since the event became international in 1925. This is the 89th time that the tournament has been held at Roland Garros, which was built for the Davis Cup Final between France and USA in 1928.

KUZUHARA BIDS FOR SECOND GRAND SLAM CROWN

USA's Bruno Kuzuhara was the star of the boys' tournament at the 2022 Australian Open, defeating Czech Republic's Jakub Mensik to win the singles title and become the sixth American player to win the Australian Open boys' singles title (after Gerry Moss in 1955, Butch Buchholz in 1959, Andy Roddick in 2000, Donald Young in 2005 and Sebastian Korda in 2018).

Kuzuhara also won the boys' doubles title in Melbourne alongside Hong Kong's Coleman Wong. The pair defeated Alex Michelsen of USA and Daniel Vallejo of Paraguay in the final.

Kuzuhara is bidding to become the first boy to win the opening 2 junior Grand Slam titles of the season since Gael Monfils, who won the boys' singles titles at the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2004. He is also bidding to become the first player to win back-to-back Grand Slam boys' singles titles since Tseng Chun-Hsin, who won both Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2018.

MARCINKO AIMS FOR FURTHER GRAND SLAM GLORY

Croatia's Petra Marcinko dropped just 2 sets en route to the girls' singles title at the Australian Open this year, with victory over Belgium's Sofia Costoulas in the final seeing her become the 4th Croatian player to win the Australian Open girls' singles title (after Mirjana Lucic in 1997, Jelena Kostanic in 1998 and Ana Konjuh in 2013).

Marcinko is bidding to become the first player to win 2 Grand Slam girls' singles titles since 2013, when Konjuh (Australian Open and US Open) and Belinda Bencic (Roland Garros and Wimbledon) each won 2 junior Grand Slam titles. She would also become the first Croatian player to win the Roland Garros girls' singles title

If she is triumphant here, Marcinko will become the first girl to win the opening 2 junior Grand Slam titles of the season since Magdalena Maleeva won the Australian Open and Roland Garros titles (as well as the US Open title later in the year) in 1990. She is also bidding to become the first player to win back-to-back Grand Slam girls' singles titles since Bencic's victories at both Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2013.

Marcinko is one of 2 Australian Open girls' singles champions to compete here this year – alongside Andorra's Victoria Jimenez Kasintseva, who won the title in Melbourne in 2020.

STRONG SOUTH AMERICAN CONTINGENT IN BOYS' DRAW

Four South American players are seeded in this year's boys' singles draw – Paraguay's Vallejo (No. 2), Peruvians Gonzalo Bueno (No. 6) and Ignacio Buse (No. 11) and Argentina's Lautaro Midon (No. 8). The quartet are among 8 South American players bidding to become the first Roland Garros boys' singles champion from the continent since Argentina's Agustin Velotti was triumphant here in 2010.

Should either Bueno or Buse lift the trophy here, they would become just the 2nd Peruvian player to win a Grand Slam boys' singles title – after 1985 Roland Garros boys' singles champion Jaime Yzaga.

If Vallejo or his compatriot Martin Antonio Vergara del Puerto win here this week, they would just become the 2nd Paraguayan player to win a Grand Slam boys' singles title – after 1973 Roland Garros boys' singles champion Victor Pecci.

CZECH GIRLS LEAD THE WAY

Nine Czech girls are competing in the singles draw here, all looking to emulate their compatriot Linda Noskova, who became the 4th Czech player to win the Roland Garros girls' singles title last year – and the first since Hana Mandlikova in 1978.

No. 4 seed Brenda Fruhvirtova leads the Czech contingent here this year, with compatriots Lucie Havlickova (No. 9), Sara Bejlek (No. 10) and Nikola Bartunkova (No. 13) also among the seeds.

HOME CHAMPIONS

Last year, Luca van Assche became the first French boys' singles champion at Roland Garros since Geoffrey Blancaneaux in 2016. Van Assche was one of four French boys to reach the semifinals here in 2021, alongside Arthur Fils (who finished runner-up), Sean Cuenin and Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard.

The final between Van Assche and Fils was the first all-French boys' singles final at Roland Garros since 2002, when Richard Gasquet defeated Laurent Recouderc, and the tournament set the record for most French boys in the semifinals at Roland Garros – surpassing the previous record of 3, set in 1949, when Robert Haillet, Alain Lemyse and Jean-Claude Molinari all reached the boys' singles semifinals.

Elsa Jacquemot is the most-recent French girls' singles champion at Roland Garros, having won the title here in 2020 and become the first home player to win the girls' singles crown since Kristina Mladenovic in 2009.

In total, there have been 13 French boys' singles champions and 15 French girls' singles champions at Roland Garros since the competitions were established.

CUENIN COMES CLOSE TO MEN'S MAIN DRAW

2021 Roland Garros boys' singles semifinalist Cuenin reached the final round of men's singles qualifying here this year, defeating Clement Tabur and Ramkumar Ramanathan before falling to Giulio Zeppieri. Cuenin is competing at his first junior event since the 2021 US Open here this week.

France's Gabriel Debru also competed in men's singles qualifying, defeating Arthur Fils in the 1st round before falling to Norbert Gombos. Among players in the girls' singles here, Jiminez Kasintseva fell to Carolina Alves in the 1st round.

AT THE DOUBLE

In 2020, Dominic Stricker became the first player to win the boys' singles and boys' doubles titles at Roland Garros in the same year since 1998, when Fernando Gonzalez won both singles and doubles titles here. The last player to win both girls' singles and doubles at Roland Garros in the same year was Agnes Szavay in 2005.

GRAND SLAM PREPARATION

The Roland Garros junior tournament is the 5th Grade A event of the 2022 season. While Kuzuhara and Marcinko were victorious at the first Grand Slam event of the year, 5 other players have claimed titles at Grade A-level so far this season, including USA's Nishesh Basavareddy, who won the boys' singles titles at both JA Criciuma and JA Milan.

Basavareddy also won the title at J1 Porto Alegre, giving him 3 clay court titles prior to Roland Garros this season. Australian Open girls' singles runner-up Costoulas has also claimed 3 title-victories in 2022, having lifted the trophies at J1 Vrsar and J1 Plovdiv before winning her first Grade A title at JA Offenbach.

Two other players have also won multiple titles at Grade 1-level and above this season: Belgium's Gilles Arnaud Bailly and Switzerland's Celine Naef, who has won 2 clay court titles in Italy this month.

PROFESSIONAL TITLE WINNERS

Only one player competing in the boys' singles draw has won a professional title – Cuenin, who won the title at M15 Shymkent (KAZ) this year.

However, 10 players competing in the girls' singles draw have won professional titles – Diana Shnaider leads the way with 4 professional titles, including her first victory at a W60-level event in Istanbul this year. Sara Bejlek, who won the title at W60 Olomouc (CZE) in 2021, is the only other player in the junior draw here to have won a title at W60 level.

2021 CHAMPIONS MAKE WAVES ON PROFESSIONAL TOURS

Noskova and Van Assche both remain eligible to compete at junior-level, but both have focused on their professional careers since their Roland Garros junior singles title victories last year.

Noskova broke the world's Top 200 in April and competed in the women's singles event here at a career-high WTA ranking of No. 184. She qualified for the main draw to make her Grand Slam debut before falling to Emma Raducanu in 3 sets in the 1st round. On the ITF World Tennis Tour, she has won 2 W60 events since her girls' singles title here last year – at W60 Prerov (CZE) last August and at W60 Croissy-Beaubourg (FRA) in April.

Van Assche has also improved his ATP ranking over the last 12 months, moving from outside the Top 1000 a year ago to reach a career-high ranking of No. 373 in May this year – and is ranked at No. 381 as of this week. He has played mainly at ATP Challenger-level this season, with his best result coming at the Cherbourg Challenger (FRA) in February, where he reached the quarterfinals (l. Constant Lestienne). He competed in men's singles qualifying here this year but fell to Juan Manuel Cerundolo in the 1st round.

FUTURE GREATNESS

Six men and six women have won both the junior title and the men's or women's singles titles. Stan Wawrinka and Simona Halep are the only junior champions since 2000 to go on to win the men's or women's singles title.

LEFTHANDERS

There are 5 lefthanders in the boys' singles draw and 7 lefthanders in the girls' singles draw here this year. The last lefthanded players to win the boys' and girls' singles titles here were Dominic Stricker (2020) and Leylah Fernandez (2019), respectively.

YOUNGEST AND OLDEST

The youngest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are wild cards Joao Fonseca (15 years 287 days) and Mathilde Ngijol-Carre (14 years 220 days), respectively.

The oldest players in the boys' singles and girls' singles tournaments here this year are Tanapatt Nirundorn (18 years 145 days) and Denislava Glushkova (18 years 147 days), respectively.

In the boys' draw there is one fifteen-year-olds, 12 sixteen-year-olds, 26 seventeen-year-olds and 25 eighteen-year-olds. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

In the girls' draw there is one fourteen-year-olds, 8 fifteen-year-olds, 20 sixteen-year-olds, 23 seventeen-year-olds and 12 eighteen-year-olds. (NB ages calculated on the last day of the tournament)

WILD CARDS

French players received 7 of the 8 available wild cards in the girls' singles draw: Sarah Iliev, Astrid Lew Yan Foon, Jenny Lim, Mathilde Ngijol-Carre, Lucia Pawlak, Tiantsoa-Sarah Rakotomanga-Rajaonah and Alice Soulie. Brazil's Olivia Carneiro was also awarded a wild card through the Road RG x Brésil programme.

French players also received 7 of the 8 available wild cards in the boys' singles draw: Paul Barbier-Gazeu, Arthur Gea, Antoine Ghibaudo, Jules Leroux, Loan Lestir, Theo Papamalamis and Tiago Pires. Brazil's Joao Fonseca was also awarded a wild card through the Road RG x Brésil programme.

COUNTRY COUNTDOWN

A total of 37 countries are represented in the junior singles draws at 2022 Roland Garros, with France having the most players competing in the boys' singles (11) and in total across both draws (19), and Czech Republic having the most players competing in the girls' singles (9). Seven players are competing as neutral athletes.
